Beekeeping notes for December:



- Check hive entrances are clear of dead bees and debris and monitor Varroa mite drop from hives. Heft hives to check food stores.
- At the end of the month/ early January, apply Oxalic Acid treatments against Varroa, if this is part of your bee health plan.
- Order in or make fondant/ pollen patties for late winter/ spring – before the rush!
- Clean up, repair and store away redundant equipment.
- Order and plant up bee-friendly Spring bulbs, such as Snowdrops, Aconites, Crocus, Tulips, and Daffs etc – although it might be a bit late now...
- Check you are registered on BeeBase and that your details are up to date.
- **Arrange and pay for your Bee Craft and HBKD January 2021 subscription (regrettably, we cannot accept cash – COVID.....).**
- Keep in touch with your fellow beekeeping chums: HBKD zoom meetings and Essex online meetings.

December Forage: Aconites, Alder, Christmas Rose, Evergreen Clematis, Cyclamen, Dandelion, Dogwood, Heather, winter flowering Honeysuckle, Ivy, Mahonia, Primrose, Strawberry Tree, Thistle, Viburnum, Willow and Winter Box.

Did you know?

Famous Beekeepers: Pope Francis (1936 – present) owns several beehives. The hives reside on the Vatican Farm, Castel Gandolfo. Nowadays, the focus is on the pollination of the vegetables, fruit and the 800 year old Olive trees that are grown on the self-sustaining organic estate. This has been the summer residence for the papal team since the 16th century – although I assume that the bee's main duty back then would have been to produce copious amounts of beeswax – think all those church service candles!



Curious corner: Spare a thought for the bees and other pollinating insects when you are preparing and enjoying your Christmas lunch. They will have pollinated some of the food that fed the Turkey, Pigs and Cattle (field beans); the herbs and ingredients in the stuffing; the leafy greens and sprouts; the various nuts (chestnuts, almonds) and spices that you will enjoy; the apples and oranges that will be in many dishes and the honey that marinated, flavoured and sweetened the dishes and of course, the Mead!
